



Thank You Letter from Mayor Scott Kaupin





A Note From The Town Clerks Office: November 4, 2008 State Election



Tuesday - October 28, 2008

The last regular session for admission in person of electors for those who become 18 years of age, U.S. Citizens or residents of the municipality on or before October 28, 2008

Monday - November 3, 2008 - 9:00 am to 12:00 noon (limited session)

Last day to admit those who have become 18, U.S. Citizens or moved to town AFTER October 28, 2008. There are also exceptions to allow servicemen to register after October 28. Most can if they are members of the armed forces and former members of the armed forces discharged within the calendar year immediately preceding the request. They must be found qualified by the registrar's office.

Friday, October 3, 2008

Absentee Ballots for those who qualify will be available in the Town Clerk's office. Applications to receive an absentee ballot can be submitted at any time, but the regular ballot cannot be issued until Friday, October 3, 2008. Forms to register and apply for an absentee ballot can be found at our website www.enfield-ct.gov or call 860-253-6440 to request forms to be mailed or with any questions.


Update from Public Works

The Highway Division, within Public Works, recently installed a total of 430 linear feet of new sidewalk on both sides of Palomba Drive. This work was completely constructed and installed by Town Employees. The installing of the section of sidewalk on the east side of Palomba Drive completes the connection from Hazard Avenue (Rt. 190) to Elm Street (Rt. 220).



Record Setting Summer at Enfield Public Libraries

The Enfield Public Library had a record setting summer. First, 991 children and young adults signed up for our summer reading program. This was an increase from 876 last year and there has been a continuous increase since 2000 when 250 children participated. July also set the record for the most circulations in one month ever for the Enfield Public Library. Enfield Central Library having 37,913 items circulated and Pearl Street Library having 2,220. Both records!

Citizen Police Academy

The Enfield Police Academy is committed to conducting an annual "Citizen Police Academy" for all of the members of the community. The primary objective of this program is to afford citizens from the community an opportunity to get a first hand overview into the Law Enforcement Operations of the Enfield Police Department, while gaining insight into the criminal justice system. In addition, this academy is dedicated to fostering a climate of mutual respect, understanding, communication, and cooperation between the members of the Enfield police department and the community it serves.

The Enfield Police Department held the first of 11 classes with 42 students, on Sep 10, 2008 of its annual Citizens Police Academy. This is the 16th consecutive year that this program has been conducted.



Enfield High School Fields Update

The Enfield High School artificial turf field and the synthetic track were accepted as substantially complete by the Town on August 25, 2008 and the schools fall athletic teams (Boys & Girls Soccer, Field Hockey and Football) have been using the artificial field for alternating practices and varsity games. The baseball and softball fields are being prepared for seeding this week and should start to look green by the end of October.



Tipper Barrel Program


Residents are required to use **gray tipper barrel(s)** to dispose of their weekly Refuse/Trash.

As of October 20, 2008 the Town **will not** pick up resident's Refuse/Trash unless it is in an approved **gray tipper barrel(s)**. Refuse/Trash **Bags** placed beside the **gray tipper barrel(s)** will not be picked up except during the week immediately following an observed holiday, (New Years Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas).
